

#### **CHAIR'S REPORT**

It's been pleasing to have completed a full season of cricket in our region in the context of the uncertainty that has hung over New Zealand in the past 24 months. At the end of March 2022, it seemed as if we had all survived a considerable period of uncertainty over COVID, bubbles. lock down periods and isolation. We can only hope that some normality can prevail as we go about our daily lives. Through it all though cricket managed to be played and most of our scheduled programmes were able to be completed. We did have some disruptions to pathway tournaments with changes to dates or even cancellations but remarkably these were exceptions. Credit should be given to New Zealand Cricket, our Major Association Central Districts and the clubs and schools for supporting the move to continue playing the game and making plans and provisions to account for the influence of COVID in the community.

Community sport is fundamental to the fabric of a community. It plays an important part in our everyday lives and contributes significantly to our social interactions, health and wellbeing. The Association has worked closely with our parent bodies, stakeholders, and members to negotiate these challenges with an emphasis on collaboration and partnership. As a Board we have continued the focus on supporting member clubs and schools to continue to deliver cricket in a disrupted environment. This has included financially supporting the clubs with an enhanced partnership agreement which benefited the clubs.

My sincere thanks to the Board for the continued commitment, time, effort and skills. This Board is passionate about the development of cricket in our region and looking after the wellbeing of our game. A vocal group, I'm never in want of an opinion, and for that I'm grateful, as the diversity of thought that is brought to the table results in better outcomes for all. Their work is voluntary, and their commitment means that the Association can be successful through good governance, prudent financial management, a strategic mindset, and a strong working relationship with management.

At the 2021 AGM, three new Board Directors were appointed. Julie Baxendine, Lesley Jones, and Win Greenaway. I thank each of you for your beneficial contributions to the governance of the Association. Kelvin Scoble succeeded Jeff Rackley as President and his wise counsel and passion for the game has been appreciated. Two new Life Members were elected at the 2021 AGM. Tony Pratt, and Jeff Rackley, who are both long time contributors to the Association. Congratulations to you both for this well-deserved honour and an appropriate acknowledgement of your service to the game in Nelson.

Congratulations to the NCA
Management for another successful
year in the delivery of community
cricket in Nelson. We are a small
organisation, but our highly skilled,
passionate, and experienced team
do a fantastic job. This season we
welcomed Dustin Emms- Healey as our
new Community Cricket officer. Dustin
has made a highly impressive start in
his important role. His passion is clear
and visible, and he has made a very

positive impact in the schools and clubs' space since he started.

Brady Barnett's work in the pathway and representative team spaces continues to provide our cricketers with opportunities to test their skills and ability against their peers outside of the region. The success of the Nyxons team is a strong example of the ability Brady possesses to bring players together and play in a happy environment which can then lead to more consistent and better performances.

**Our Operations Manager Tim** Murdoch has again led the Association well across all areas and facets of the game here. Tim has worked collaboratively with the cricket community and our supporting organisations and has developed strong relationships with all stakeholders. Sadly, for the Board and the Association, Tim resigned at the end of August to take up a new position in Christchurch. We sincerely thank Tim for his muchappreciated contribution over nearly two years. The quiet professionalism and involved work across several stakeholder groups has brought us closer, and we are the better for it. Tim your contribution has been huge, thank vou.

The financial report and statements contained in the Annual Report reflect a satisfactory result for the year ended 30 June 2022. As noted, the Board continued its strategic objective of funding the game through support to the clubs and schools and retaining a strong pathway and representative team programme. The achievement of our

NZC/ CD partnership KPI bonuses and astute financial management from our wider Board team has resulted in the solid financial result posted and a good level of reserves for the years ahead.

#### **OPERATIONS MANAGER'S REPORT**

#### The Season

Last season's report started with a comment about Covid and its influence on the previous season. While Covid was still present during the 2021/22 season there was very little disruption to the seasons programme. Some junior teams were forced to default towards the end of the season but there were not huge numbers of those affected teams, so most competition matches were able to be played as scheduled.

The team entries for the 2021/22 season saw adult team numbers on a par with the previous season and a pleasing small increase in the number of junior and Youth teams. We introduced a new Fourth grade competition post-Christmas as an alternative to the existing College Youth grade. Five teams joined this grade which justified the move.

The Premier Grade had a different look about it for 2021/22. The 110 over competition was shelved and a 40 over competition played in its place. Wet conditions in October meant that the early rounds of this competition were played on artificial pitches teams which the teams readily agreed to. ACOB were the winners of this competition which started a great run of title wins by them over the season. After the Tasman Premier League competition was concluded ACOB completed their very successful and unbeaten season winning the Car Company T20 competition on the final Saturday of the season. Three competition successes for ACOB team saw them win the coveted Kirkpatrick Cup for overall Premier Grade supremacy for the 2021/22 season in addition to numerous other trophies.



ACOB team were for the third consecutive season crowned the winner of the Tasman Premier League team. They really did dominate the competition and finished the season unbeaten and were rarely put under strong pressure by their opponents. For next season the TPL will be shelved and a return to two-day cricket is planned for the Premier grade. There was a view amongst the clubs that the TPL had run its course at this time and there needed to be a new competition format to give the players a new challenge.

In an innovation for the Premier grade a Premier Competition team of the Season was announced at the Awards function. The players selected were

At the start of the season, it had been hoped that there would be sufficient entries for Third Grade to stand alone as a competition, but this did not eventuate and the competition was played as a top 6, bottom competition. Wakatu Gold won the 40 over competition and WTTU Bengals the T20 competition in the top six section. WTTU Siberians won the bottom 6 (Third Grade) 40 over competition to cap off a good season for the resurgent WTTU club.

The Presidents Grade competition was made up of eleven teams. Bad weather on a few Friday nights saw the competition extended by a few weeks. WTTU Scared Shotless defeated Wakatu Big Swing No Ding in the final of this popular social competition.

We express our sincere gratitude and thanks to the Nelson City Council and the Tasman District Council who are our major facility/ venues partners. We are appreciative of the strong working relationship we enjoy with them and their ability to work positively and constructively with us on ground matters helps solve any issues that may arise promptly and efficiently.

Our sincere thanks are expressed to Rob Coleman and Nick Hoffman from TDC and Mitch Pownall, Hamish Bloomfield, and Nick Knight from NCC for the roles and leadership they provide. Thanks also to the passionate ground staff in both Councils who dedicate many hours to ensuring the facilities we play on are prepared and maintained to the best possible standards.

#### Wakatu CC Centenary

A highlight of the season was the celebration over Labour weekend 2021 of the centenary of the Wakatu club. What a tremendous achievement for the club and its many members to reach this magic milestone. The centenary celebrations were well attended and the dinner on the Sunday night was a polished and entertaining event with the guests being well entertained by Denis Aberhart and Chris Harris. The Wakatu Premiers played their 40 over match on Saxton Oval on the Saturday while a less vigorous Past players was enjoyed by all on the Sunday.

The DuFeu family, led by the tireless Greg, worked exceedingly hard to bring all the different components together to deliver a most successfully and memorable occasion for the participants. Congratulations to them and the other contributors on reaching the milestone and pushing on strongly to the next hundred.



#### **Representative Cricket**

Elsewhere in this report Brady
Barnett has reported on the
performances of the various
representative and pathway teams
over the season. The Griffins
team won back the prestigious
Newman Shield and held it in the
return match. In the Hawke Cup
Marlborough edged the Griffins
in a very close match, Buller
were comfortably defeated, and
Canterbury Country were just too
strong.



From the representative team perspective, the highlight of the season was the performance of the Nyxons team who grew from strength to strength in the Shrimpton Trophy competition. They capped off their inaugural season in this competition with a meritorious win over Manawatu at Saxton Oval.

A number of Nelson players represented Central Districts at the various levels over the season. A big congratulations to Claudia Green who was a member of the White Ferns team who participated in the Commonwealth Games in Birmingham and came home with a bronze medal.

#### **Hosting**

We were due to host three Women's International ODIs against India in early February 2022 as a lead into the Women's World Cup. Regrettably because of Covid these matches were transferred to Queenstown. This was very disappointing as a considerable amount of work in pre planning and organising the matches had already taken place.

Partly as a consolation, we were asked to host the Bangladesh Women's World Cup team in a pretournament training camp. Earlier in January we hosted the White Ferns for a similar training camp. Both teams really enjoyed their time in Nelson and were both very complimentary about the practice facilities at Saxton, the catering from Tania and Murray and how well they were looked after during their visit.

Domestically we hosted a Plunket Shield match and two women's HBJ matches. These matches all went well, and the pitch reports were highly complementary about the pace, bounce and overall quality of the pitches. The reports were some of the best ever received for the Saxton Oval pitches and are a direct reflection of the hard work and skill that Nick Knight, Matt O'Sullivan and their team have put into the wicket block and outfield. We thank them for their contribution, their willingness to enable cricket to be played on the Oval and their cooperation over a busy season all while they had other work obligations away from Saxton.



The question about future international hosting opportunities at Saxton has been a topic of much discussion recently. We have not been allocated any international matches this coming season and while we are looking to host three domestic matches, it is international matches which drive the public, the Councils, and the city. Discussions have been held with the Saxton Oval subcommittee, the Nelson Council, New Zealand Cricket, and Central Districts about what is needed to make a stronger case for matches to be allocated to Nelson. There is no doubt that Saxton Oval does lack some infrastructure elements which would make match allocations easier. The question of how this infrastructure can be put in place and who pays for it is the heart of the questions at this time.

During the season the Association purchased the electronic scoreboard that we had previously shared with Tasman Rugby and the Council. This is a valuable acquisition as it adds to the infrastructure requirements of the Oval and also provides the Association with an opportunity to rent the board out to other organisations.

#### Collaboration

The support provided to the Association by both New Zealand Cricket and Central Districts is very much valued and appreciated. There is regular communication from both organisations either through the monthly meeting amongst the District Associations and NZC, annual forums covering a variety of current and future issues and a consistent flow of information and guidance.

Nigel Brooke, the Community Cricket Manager for Central Districts, has been an invaluable source of information and guidance. He is a terrific asset for Associations like Nelson, very knowledgeable and happy to share experiences and to encourage and lead in the community cricket area.

Close contact has been maintained with Marlborough Cricket throughout the year through meetings, inter association games at many levels and support for each other at national and association forums. This is best illustrated when together we have discussed the possibility of joining forces to put a Tasman team in the Furlong Cup (zone 2 of the Hawke Cup competition) in the future. While this would be at the expense of the current zone 3 of the Hawke Cup, we feel that we need to be playing against the other CD representative teams, allowing our players to compete against their peers and to make us feel more a part of the Central Districts player pathway. Already at the women's level, Marlborough players are a much-valued part of the Nyxons programme.

Thanks also to Kent Stead and his Community Cricket team at NZC for their leadership and encouragement. Their regular communications and guidance allow our Association and the clubs to focus on delivering the game to our community.



#### **Club Partnership Agreement**

The Board again made a significant financial investment in the partnership between them and the Clubs through the 2021/22 season. The investment was formalised by way of a cricket partnership agreement which set out five specified modules which the clubs agreed to deliver as their commitment to the community game.

As a precursor to the agreements being drawn up, Alec Astle, the former Development Manager of New Zealand Cricket, visited Nelson and took the clubs through a Club Planning session which was of great benefit to the clubs.

The clubs were required to present a plan which was agreed to by Nelson Cricket and the clubs were required to report against their plan twice during the season and agreed funding was released once the reports were tabled and signed off by the Association.

#### Voice of the Participant Survey

New Zealand Crickets Annual Voice of the Participant survey for 2021/22 delivered so good news for the Association and its membership. The results indicated a supportive, friendly, and encouraging environment in the Association, general satisfaction with the running of cricket, value for money and a large majority of participants wanting to continue playing. The Association was perceived as professional and well managed and delivering good prompt communications.

While we recognise there are areas we can do better in and make improvements to player development programmes, there seems to vindication to the work of the Board and staff in driving the game forward in a positive direction.







#### **Volunteers**

Nelson Cricket is very fortunate to have many outstanding volunteers supporting club, school, adult, and junior cricket. Their passion and enthusiasm provide the various clubs and schools with leadership, administrative controls, and coaching skills that enable them to continue to provide cricket at every level and to operate in a professional and sustainable manner.

#### **Umpires**

We are extremely grateful to the continued commitment of Neil Capstick, Barry Blommaart, Damian Chapman, Trevor Garnett, and Euan Mitchell who were the umpires who regularly stood in Premier and TPL matches. Congratulations to Neil who was named Umpire of the Year at the end of season Awards function and who also undertook the responsibility of appointments and payments for standing umpires. Barry was awarded the Presidents Cup for services to cricket at the Awards function. Barry has been involved in cricket and particularly umpiring for over 50 years, a wonderful contribution.

While membership and new recruits are still a concern, it is heartening to see two First Class umpires take up residence in the Nelson region. John Bromley who has recently retired from the NZC panel and John Dempsey still a current panel member, have both indicated their interest in taking an active role in umpiring and off field recruitment and education sessions. That can only be good news for the umpire ranks.

While the Griffins men's team didn't have the success of the previous season in their Hawke Cup programme, they did win the Newman Shield back off Marlborough and retained it at the seasons end. Under Brady's leadership and guidance several young players came into the team programme and at the end of the season were beginning to show the benefit of their exposure to this level.

For 2021/22 the performance of the Nyxons was one of the more exciting successes. Brady championed for them to participate in the Shrimpton Trophy for the first time and they performed admirably. The highlight being the win over the eventual competition winners Manawatu at Saxton Oval in late February was simply stunning and a testament to the work of Brady, in skill execution but also within the team environment. Teams and their members need to relax and enjoy playing the game and Brady manages these aspects particularly well.



#### Conclusion

I write this report as I am about to finish my time with Nelson Cricket. I am genuinely sad and disappointed I cannot conclude the work I started here in October 2020 and to continue what I believe is the good progress the Board, management and the Association have made. I had planned to do another season and then review things at that time. The Christchurch job wasn't initially on my radar but in the end the opportunity presented itself and I had to decide.

I will be eternally grateful to the Board for giving me an opportunity to work for the Association and to work in cricket again. The job pushed me out of my comfort zone and that has been a good thing. After a shaky beginning I found my feet and have enjoyed the challenge and the experience. I have met and

engaged with plenty of good cricket people who have supportive and encouraging for the direction we have looked to drive the game in. I will certainly miss my involvement in Nelson Cricket and its people will always have a place in my heart.

Finally, my sincere thanks to all the Nelson Cricket Association family who have worked so hard to make cricket happen over this last season. You have provided the best possible experience for those playing recreational and community cricket. Your commitment. Your energy and your passion are very much appreciated by those who participate and enjoy cricket in Nelson.

#### REPRESENTATIVE TEAMS REPORT

The 2021/22 season promised to be a huge one for many reasons. With the inclusion of a thorough pathway programme which aimed at narrowing some obvious gaps, while also providing a greater opportunity for our players to play more cricket.

We added a number of developing teams into our programmes which included:

- 2x Under 15 Development Teams
- Emerging Players
- Multiple Town vs Country Fixtures
- Nelson Nyxon's Team

The existing sides included;

- Nelson Griffins Men's
- Nelson Mens Under 17
- Nelson Boys Under 15
- Nelson Girls Under 15
- Nelson Junior Girls

Although we navigated some huge challenges with understanding Covid-19 protocols and processes we managed a large amount of players this season through these programmes. We had a number of games and age group competitions postponed and/or cancelled through Covid-19 times. However the effort and co-operation from the coaches, parents and players was extremely pleasing.

The Nelson Men's kicked off their season off with a very thorough preseason which saw a number of new players involved this season. We knew that this season would offer greater challenges with new players, travel, schedule changes, injuries and availability of players. However

as we have worked extremely hard on developing the culture and identity of this group we wanted this to continue.

First up we had a nail biting win vs Marlborough in Marlborough to win the Newman Shield. There was a number of contributions throughout the batting which saw Nelson post 200+. As we have seen these games go very close over the past few years, this was no different. Marlborough took it very deep and Nelson opening bowler Josh Newport kept his nerve in the final over to restrict Marlborough.

Nelson had a number of learnings through the Hawke Cup campaign. Again another very close game vs Marlborough which saw them strike a couple of big sixes in the last over to see them get first innings. Nelson set a very competitive total of 270+ however could not break Marlborough 5th wicket stand.

Canterbury Country we were beaten convincingly. Country showed there class vs the griffins with the availability of their first class cricketers. Nelson showed some huge fight with the bat, with a number of players facing a large amount of balls, however we struggled with developing



any meaningful partnerships and or breakthroughs with the ball. Although we were well beaten, it gave us a better indication as to where we are at and what this group this needs to improve on to be the best Hawke Cup Team in New Zealand.

Buller was a decent game in which we fought hard on day 1. A large 9th wicket partnership from Skipper Ollie Jones saw us pass Buller's target. A special mention has to go to Jonty Raxworthy who took 5 wickets in each innings ending with 10 for the match which saw Nelson win comfortably outright. This concluded our Hawke Cup campaign, and although we didn't get all the results we worked hard at, the emergence of some new players in the group and greater understanding of the direction this group needs to develop was evident and collectively we work on these.

Our Pathways saw a huge increase of activity this season. We aimed at growing our groups through the ages of school years 9 to 13. Over the two groups we had close to 70 players participate in this winter programme. We ran an 8 week pre-season for this group leading into the season with the aim of developing fundamental



movements in both batting and bowling processes, while also giving all involved a wee taste of requirements at the higher level. It was a huge success and something we will look to continue to grow and develop for years to come.

Due to Covid-19, our under 17 Men's and age grade girls teams had their tournaments cancelled last minute. This was hugely disappointing given that late cancelations, however something we learnt to manage. The group prepared extremely well having beat Marlborough in a one off game in March.

Our under 15 boys team had a great programme and due to lucky timings it allowed their tournament and games to continue. This team went north a few days prior to tournament. Thank you to

Merv, Wendy and Simon for their organisation and leadership for this group. The team played Hutt Academy and Wairarapa as a lead up to tournament. The tournament itself saw a number of players stand up throughout. A huge highlight was Nelson having 2 players who scored hundreds. These were Nelson College player Kurt Ward and Waimea College student Carl Quinn.

To finalise, I would like to thank all the coaches who gave up their time this season to ensure our groups were well prepared. Your efforts throughout the season are hugely appreciated.

#### **COMMUNITY CRICKET REPORT**

This report is to outline activities undertaken and outputs achieved in the 2021/22 season.

My first task was to understand the new role and what was needed. Getting my feet under the desk essentially and learning the lay of the land. I called/emailed around each of the clubs and had conversations or meetings with key members from each club in our region. The purpose of this was to introduce myself and explain my role and offer my help wherever needed, as well as looking at coach numbers and talking through any general thoughts on the upcoming season. I also contacted a few senior members from NZC and CD to get a better idea of what others are doing in similar roles around the country

and understanding how I could best serve NCA.

I worked with Tim to refine the new Partnership Agreement and aided with its implementation into the club scene. I think this went down well, a much better and more streamlined version of the Club Hub from previous years. Clubs seem to be more on board with this than club hub as its more about what they're doing and less about how they're doing it.

I created a Key Contact Sheet for all clubs & schools in the region to aid in my communications between



club and school to improve our relationships with all parties and called around the schools to confirm the best person to deal with. In addition, I also created a Community Cricket Calendar to easily share with schools and clubs around my availability to attend events or Cricket awareness sessions at school.

The other aspect of my role was as a Coach Developer. We ran a Police Vetting/CricHQ Night at Saxton Indoor Centre in November and we held an Advanced Foundation Course which was led by Nigel Brooke in February 2022 which was attended by 20 coaches from around the region. Our list of current registered coaches increased from 80 – 85 from the season prior.

#### Pathway Cricket City v Country

I took over the reins of the U15 8 weeks into the programme after BJ, Merv Ward & Simon Bixley had done the first selection. It started off as red and blue groups as was the inherited set up. We played one game in its current form before the second was rained off.

At this point covid was brewing up and Unfortunately the Canterbury festival was postponed from December to January. BJ & I made the decision to pull our two sides (Blue & Red) from the comp at that stage due to rising cost and the cost of rebooking and time of work for parents etc. This proved to be the

correct decision as the festival was ultimately cancelled in January.

To give our youth some meaningful cricket, we revived the City v Country matches. This was very successful with many of the U15 rep players wanting to come back and be involved as well, which some did. We had a large squad of around 35 players, and we were able to provide a fair sharing of games as it fitted in with families and their availabilities across the 1.5 games.

Game 1 – abandoned during play just before it became a "live game" in the second innings. The match was very close at that stage.

Game 2 – City Won 224 – 165 at Motueka CC in Memorial Park – A great game highlighted by an excellent 91 from Kurt Ward.

Game 3 - Rained out at SNCC

In addition to City Vs Country, NCA U16 development XI took on Titoki Cricket Club and Marlborough at their respective grounds.

The revival of City v Country wasn't done there however, We arranged for Second Grade to have their own fixture which was hosted by Wakatu CC in their 100th year as a club. The fixture was a close one with two strong sides captained by Bryan Krammer (City) & Justin Hobbs (Country). The City side prevailed in the end chasing down 205 in the second to last over 6 down.

#### In school

#### - Cricket Awareness Programme

The following schools were visited and completed at least one 45 minute "Cricket Awareness Session" with every class. A real effort was made to get to as many of the country schools as possible. Mostly to try and give back to the countryside which has been so productive for NCA over the years, but also because Motueka and Wanderers were unfortunately left without a coach to fulfil their scheduled Cricket Awareness Sessions, that were already planned with their schools, right before the season started.

NCA – Tasman School, Mapua School, Mahana School, Upper Moutere School, Brooklyn School, Golden Bay High School (2 days), Riwaka School, Tapawera Area School, Ranzau School

Wakatu CC – Nelson Central School x2, Nelson Intermediate School x2, Hampden Street School x2, Victory Primary School x2, Saint Joseph's School,

**Wanderers CC** – Dovedale School, Brightwater School

**ACOB** – Clifton Terrace School, Hira School, Nelson College Prep

SNCC - Birchwood School

**Our Cricket Awareness Sessions** proved to be more than just trips to spread the joy of cricket to the kids. Each school visit felt we were unlocking a new level of a game, with each school came a new cricket champion/contact in that area. Special mentions go out to Dovedale School & Tapawera school, who both have a solid group of adult cricketers behind the scenes keen to re-enter cricket. As well as providing some best practice when we could go with coaches from the clubs, I hope with more time to advanced warning we can get more sessions with a coach from the respective club to accompany Dustin.

There were more schools on the booked in but with Covid in the region it became too difficult in some cases. Each school had their own rules around which and when contractors could enter schools, so it was a matter of playing the ball as it came.





#### Super Star Kiwi / Cricket

Super Star Cricket was held mostly at the Nelson Suburbs Football grounds and Saxton Oval which for a variety of reasons wasn't available to host these sessions as much as previously. Ella Ranson & Ruby McIntyre ran the show down there in term four and then three new girls from Wanderers in term one, Maddison, Freya & Julia. We thank them all for giving up their Saturday mornings to help encourage the young players starting the game in a friendly and safe environment .In the post season review meetings, it was agreed that the best Superstar setup in the region was the Friday night session at Motueka and in an attempt to emulate Motueka's setup, Saturday morning softball would stop, and club sessions would take on more emphasis, becoming a Junior Club Night. NZC has since release a new junior programme called smash play. Smash Play will be extremely helpful in the delivery of our Junior Programme throughout the NCA clubs.



#### Yeah! Girls 2021/22

Yeah! Girls is aimed at getting Rangatahi (Youth) girls playing cricket like games, to eventually lure them into proper cricket in the future. It is a fun and exciting space which we are seeing meaningful growth in. Dustin Emms-Healey was employed as Lead Activator and Ella Ranson & Freya Walkenshaw were employed as Activators.

This was my first full season of running Yeah! Girls. Starting in term four put us on the back foot a little, making it harder to get into schools in term four. However. we still managed to get meaningful Hubs going in term four at Nelson Intermediate School. **Nelson College for Girls** - Prep, Hampden Street School, and Saint Paul's school. Hubs were attempted at Motueka CC but failed to get any traction with the Rangatahi, and a small Hub at Mapua without much success. Our registered numbers at the end of term 4 were approximately 65.

In term one we were right in the middle of the covid outbreak in Nelson so it was difficult to get into many schools again with some saying no outside contractors could attend. However, we managed to get the following Hubs running and had a good last half of the term Hubs were run at Saxton Indoor Centre, Nelson College for Girls, Nelson Intermediate School, Golden Bay Highschool. By the end of term 1 we had achieved all our goals as set by NZC and had over 100 registered players at our hubs.



In addition to this Marlborough Girls came over the Whangamoas to take on Waimea College Girls XI & the new Nelson College for Girls 1st XI which has stemmed straight out of Yeah! Girls & the work Wakatu CC had done over the season, creating a strong base of female cricketers in the city limits.

NZC has unfortunately cancelled the Milo Cup (Intermediate School Tournament ) however, We ran our own game with Nelson Intermediate School & Waimea Intermediate School competing with both boys & girls sides at WIS right at the end of the season.

Yeah! Girls goes, the highlights were opening new Hubs at Saxton, Nelson Girls College & Golden Bay as well as recruiting Catherine Hockley to run our new hub in Golden Bay next season.

- Cricket Awareness Programmes for every class in Nelson/Tasman & Golden Bay.
- A Smooth and successful implementation of the Smash Play Programme for our juniors.
- An increase across the board in playing numbers & Coaches.
- Further improve relationships and lines of communication and cooperation with all clubs and schools.
- City vs Country Matches for both Second and Third Grade.
- Work with Golden Bay or Takaka Cricket Club and help them get on their feet to ignite the talented rangatahi in that region.
- Grow Yeah! Girls by 20% and open a new Hub at Victory School.
- Run a successful Y9/10 Pathway Programme. Ensuring that this fragile age group is retained and not lost as is the current trend through NZC.
- Work to create a Tasman Presidents Grade competition for Dovedale CC, Tapawera CC, Mapua CC & Riwaka CC as well as a separate satellite Presidents Grade competition for Golden Bay, Takaka & Collingwood.
- Continuing all other Community Cricket Projects from last year.

Thank you very much for this opportunity to spread my love of Cricket to our region, I truly believe the work started last year in the Community Cricket Programme will pay fruits this year and for many to come.

#### FINANCIAL REPORT

For the year ended 30 June 2022, Nelson Cricket generated a surplus of \$14,862. Detailed information can be found in the audited Performance Report contained within the Annual Report.

The year continued to be challenging with revenue decreasing by 3% to \$427,000 and expenses increasing by 29% to \$413,000. As signaled last year, we had moved back into a position to invest again in the cricket community and the increase in expenses reflects that. The expenses include the new role of Cricket Community Coordinator and strong support for tournament participation and coaching. There was also a significant increase in depreciation charges related to acquiring a scoreboard.

- (a) Renewing the head sponsorship agreement with Nelson Pine Industries for an extended 5 year term and increased annual sponsorship amount;
- (b) Purchasing the electronic scoreboard with support of a Mainland Foundation grant;
- (c) Continuation of support to Clubs with payments increasing by 29% from the previous year; and
- (d) Continued reduction of legacy debts to Nelson City Council and Tasman District Council by \$14,581.

While careful ongoing financial management is required, our reserves remain at a level that provides comfort to provide ongoing support to the Nelson cricket community.

Nelson Cricket is very grateful for the support from sponsors including Nelson Pine Industries and Signature Homes. In addition, we would not be able to operate without the grant funding received from Mainland Foundation, NZ Community Trust, Rata Foundation, Lion Foundation and Pub Charity.

#### **Basis of Preparation**

Nelson Cricket Association Incorporated has elected to apply PBE SFR-A (NFP) Public Benefit Entity Simple Format Reporting - Accrual (Not-For-Profit) on the basis that it does not have public accountability and has total annual expenses of equal to or less than \$2,000,000. All transactions in the Performance Report are reported using the accrual basis of accounting. The Performance Report is prepared under the assumption that the entity will continue to operate in the foreseeable future.

#### Goods and Services Tax (GST)

All amounts are recorded exclusive of GST, except for Debtors and Creditors which are stated inclusive of GST.

#### Income Tax

No provision for Income Tax has been made as Nelson Cricket Association (Inc) is exempt from Income Tax under the amateur sports exemption contained in Section CW46 of the Income Tax Act 2007.

#### **Bank Accounts and Cash**

Bank accounts and cash in the Statement of Cash Flows comprise cash balances and bank balances (including short term deposits) with original maturities of 90 days or less.

#### **Fixed Assets and Depreciation**

All fixed assets are recorded at cost less accumulated depreciation.

Depreciation of the assets has been calculated at the maximum rates permitted by the Income Tax Act 2007.

The entity has the following asset classes:

Facilities Asset. 16% Diminishing Value

Office Equipment. 20% - 50% Diminishing Value

Plant & Equipment. 14.4% - 60% Diminishing Value

#### **Changes in Accounting Policies**

There have been no changes in accounting policies during the financial year (last year - nil).

#### **Revenue Policu**

Fundraising and Grant income is accounted for depending on whether or not it has a "use or return" condition attached. Where no use or return conditions are attached, the revenue is recorded as income when the cash is received. Where income includes a use or return condition, it is initially recorded as a liability on receipt. The income is then subsequently recognised within the Statement of Financial Performance as the performance conditions are met.

#### Opinion

  manner that achieves fair presentation.


